Our class was able to enjoy one last field trip in March before the closure to the St. Boniface Museum where the students learned some good old-fashioned Manitoba history. They toured the famous museum and explored artifacts from the formation of our province, the fur trade era, Louis Riel, and the Grey Nuns settlement. Students participated in activities that highlighted how different life was back then. They carded wool used to make clothes, carried buckets to collect water, washed clothes by hand using a washing board and soap, and constructed

It was great to see so many of you at school over the past couple weeks. It was a nice break from distance learning. Our school year started with a camping theme and it ended much the same way! We participated in social distancing camp activities and had a lot of fun! The grade 5's are a competitive bunch! We also reviewed concepts in math and language arts. We played multiplication bingo, made a year end booklet, played a teacher related, "Would you rather," game, engaged in a drama circle and of course had recess. It was a great way to end off the school year. I hope you all have a very enjoyable and peaceful summer!













6F

Despite the very different end to the year, the students in 6F have shown their resiliency and dedication to learning. Students participated in an at-home design process challenge where they had to create a paper airplane that successfully performed different stunts! Students used their knowledge of the different features and movements of a plane from our science unit about flight. Students commented on how many changes they had to make to get their plane to work! In social studies, students have been diving into the history of Canada from the 1930s to World War II. Students have been creating scrapbooks and imagining

they were living during these time periods. They have also been creating talk-shows to conduct "interviews" with Prime Minister Mackenzie King about Canada's involvement in World War II. We have connected our learning of World War II with language arts and have been studying a series of short fiction stories set during World War II in different parts of the world. These books have opened up discussions of the French Resistance, the Holocaust, and the perspective of children living during World War II in addition to lessons about character, theme, and plot. Most

recently, students have been studying the novel, *Number the Stars* by Lois Lowry, set in Denmark during World War II. The story really has students thinking about what the word bravery means. Finally, students have most recently been exploring angles and measurement at home in their math learning. Students have been learning how to identify angles in everyday life and how to find area, perimeter, and volume. Those students coming to school have connected this learning to an in-class Food Truck War, which involves students designing and creating a 3D food truck!

The students in 6F have really been showing their creativity and amazing work ethic during distance learning. Have a wonderful summer!

What a year it has been! Prior to the pandemic grade six was focused on discovering the effects of plastic on us and our world. We had many interesting driving questions such as: How does plastic end up in the oceans? What is the lifecycle of plastic? How do we use plastic in our everyday life? Grade six discovered many benefits and consequences of the use of plastic. During the pandemic, we focused on the concept of decimals and how they apply to everyday life.

We used our skills in creating a business in the form

of a food truck. Each student had to brainstorm, plan, design, and implement a business plan. We had a variety of ideas from Spanish cuisine, multiple dessert trucks, chicken wings, and burgers to name a few. Students designed their signature menu items along with costs. Students then ordered from one another's menus.

As the year draws to an official close, we say goodbye to most of our girls as well as a couple of other students. We hope and pray that you come back to visit in the future.



The grade seven class successfully transitioned into junior high through this unique school year. They are prepared to lead the student body in the 2020 school year with plenty of school spirit and enthusiasm. The grade sevens enjoyed various field trips this year including a self guided exploration at the Human Rights Museum, a moving and informative residential school performance at the MTYP, and an exciting Beatles inspired adaptation of William Shakespeare's As You Like It. In a timely and relevant assignment, they researched important past and present members of the African-American community during Black History Month. They explored the lives and influence of famous people such as Duke Ellington, Maya Angelou, and Jackie Robinson, just to name a few. They learned of the history of racial

inequality through their research, as well as through classroom analysis of various pieces of literature and film. With the current situation in both the United States and the rest of the world, the grade sevens have educated themselves

on this most important subject.

Although this year was far from typical, the class worked through science fair projects, three novel studies, challenging math problems, and even participated in a class model UN exercise. The class was extremely active in school activities. Through music clubs, sports teams, house group activities, and volunteer hours, the grade seven class were a visible element of the SJB community in 2019-2020. When the school year drastically switched to an online platform, their commitment and enthusiasm remained strong. They certainly never let the pandemic hinder their spirit. They are excited to take on a leading role for the SJB student body as grade eight students in the fall.



The second term was a busy one for our junior high students. We traveled to Holiday Mountain for our annual ski trip and had some of the nicest weather Mr. Toni has seen in all his years at this school. A big thanks to all our parent volunteers. We also attended MTYP to view a play that highlighted some of the trauma that children attending residential schools experienced. While COVID-19 kept us away from our classrooms, the boys showed up in good spirits to our weekly meetings, sporting funny hats, costumes, and showing off their dance moves on occasion.

The grade seven class spent their term watching me try to record myself doing video labs. I regret that I won't soon be the next YouTube science sensation. They also looked at how ecosystems change over time, including local examples such as the Netley-Libau Marsh as the Red River joins Lake Winnipeg. In social studies, we discussed how globalization and westernization are affecting communities around the globe. When some students chose to return in June, we applied this knowledge to case studies in Rwanda and the plight of the Indigenous people of the Amazon rainforest, as well as completed a Model UN simulation to round out our unit on international cooperation.

The grade eight class spent their time at home looking at a variety of issues surrounding water such as countries fighting over rivers in the Middle East, areas losing their groundwater supply, how waterborne diseases spread, and the journey our freshwater takes in Winnipeg to our taps. We then moved on to our study of cells, and applied this knowledge to trying to understand how bacteria, viruses and our immune system do battle inside our bodies. The boys who returned to school were able to dissect a cow's eyeball to look at how different structures can combine to form an organ with their own...eyes.
